


What happens when I get to school?

"Well done, Lucy!"


You will learn new things as you play. At first you might find something a little bit tricky but your teacher will encourage you to keep trying. We all say "I will challenge myself and I will never give up".




Zac, Mira and Tom are cutting out shapes.

At playtimes, there are kind grown-ups who will help and look after you. They wear bright yellow jackets, so they are very easy to spot. We also have lovely friends called 'playground buddies', who are older children. They will also help you and play with you.

Ling cannot find Lucy at playtime and doesn't know what to do. She finds Katie, who is one of the playground buddies.

"Please can you help me find my friend Lucy?" says Ling.

"I think she has gone to the toilet," says Katie. "Why don't you play

with me until she comes back?"

What if I am hungry or thirsty?

At lunchtime, you will go into the hall for your meal. You will choose your meal in the morning when school starts. There are lots of kind grown-ups to help you in the lunch hall.

lu u a We use good table manners, which means that you use your knife and fork to eat. You will tidy away your tray and cutlery when you have finished.

We always want you to learn and try new things, so we will encourage you to try new foods. When you finish your lunch, you put up your hand to tell a grown-up that you have finished.

Arthur is clearing up after his lunch. He has finished eating, which means he can tidy up and go outside to play.



What happens if I need the toilet?

What happens at the end of the school day?



When you need to go to the toilet, let a grown-up know by saying "please may I go to the toilet?" If you need to go during playtime, the kind grown-ups in the playground will show you where the lunchtime toilets are.

Lucy has told a grown-up that she needs to go to the toilet. When she has finished, she remembers to flush the toilet and wash and dry her hands.

The boys' toilets have urinals. If you haven't used one before, ask your grown-ups to show you how they work before you come to school. They are very easy to use.





When school is ending for the day, you will listen to a story read by your teacher.

At home time, you will gather your coat and belongings. Your book bag will have any messages from your teacher to your grown-ups. Sometimes it will also have activities for you to enjoy doing at home with your family. Remind your grown-ups to check inside your book bag each day.

Then you will line up to leave the classroom. Your grown-ups will be waiting outside for you. When your teacher sees your grown-ups, they will say "goodbye" and you can go.

Lucy is going home with her mum.
