
# Charlton Kings Infants' School 27<sup>th</sup> October 2023







We have had a busy and exciting start to the 23-24 academic year and are so proud of the way that our new children have transitioned into school, with other year groups transitioning to new classes and new routines. I was particularly proud of our children at our KS1 harvest celebration at the Sacred Hearts church and our EYFS children's celebration at the Baptist church. We enjoyed singing, reading poems and sharing all of the food we had collected with the Cheltenham Foodbank. We are looking forward to a visit by the Cheltenham Foodbank next term when they will be telling us all about where our food goes and how it helps children and families in our town.

This term we have been exploring our school theme of 'Community and Belonging'. We have been thinking about new beginnings and the emotions that these provoke, and how we can help ourselves and each other to understand and support these emotions. We have also been thinking about how we can work together to keep everyone safe within our school community.





We have enjoyed exploring these texts during assembly time and thinking about the families and groups that we belong to. We have also enjoyed celebrating Black History month, finding out about those who have changed the world, including Mae Carol Jemison, an American engineer, physician, and former NASA astronaut. She became the first black woman to travel into space when she served as a mission specialist aboard the Space Shuttle Endeavour.



We have also been thinking about our RESPECT learning characters—Rebecca resilience and Sophia self awareness and what it means to have self awareness and be resilient.

This term, we have been exploring our whole school theme 'Into the Darkness' with YR learning about themselves and their new classmates before moving on to explore 'Space'. Y1 have been thinking about what they can see in 'The Dark' and Y2 have been exploring what gives us light with their topic of 'Fire, Fire!' It has been wonderful to see the children's outstanding achievements, and their pride in sharing these outcomes with each other and their teachers. We look forward to sharing these with you during our parents' evenings after half term (Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> or Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> November). 


I am Mrs Galvin and I am the outdoor play Supervisor. I lead the team of adults and children supporting games and activities at lunchtimes.

### Reception

It has been wonderful to welcome all the new Reception children to our school and see how well they have settled in. We enjoyed sharing all their beautifully decorated treasure boxes of special objects and memories which helped us to get to know one another.



As well as having lots of fun both inside our classrooms and in the outdoor area, Reception have also been keeping active with their 'Wake and Shake', daily mile, pilates and P.E. sessions. Trips to the new school library to share books has also been a highlight.







'We're going on a bear hunt, we're going to catch a big one...' we all chanted as we followed the trail of bear paw prints around school which led us to Mrs James' office and a bear reading his favourite book! Another favourite activity during our bear theme was a teddy bear picnic of jam sandwiches with our furry friends.

We have learnt a lot about Autumn and seasonal weather in the last few weeks and were very excited to see a beautiful rainbow in the playground this week. Our impressive conker collections have inspired lots of counting practice in our maths activities whilst we have been using our subitising eyes and comparing more and fewer.

Finally, we were very proud of the Reception children for their contributions to our Harvest Festival in the Baptist church. They sang up with enthusiasm and retold the story of The Little Red Hen to a packed audience. It has been a very busy start to the year but we have been impressed with how well the children have settled into school routines and wish them all a very happy and restful holiday.

## Year 1

We have had a fantastic start to Year 1! We have started exploring our big question 'what can you see in the dark?' through Funnybones, which led us to find out more about the different parts of our body, our bones and the organs inside. We have started learning about our senses and were very lucky to be visited by an optician and optometrist, who told us all about how they help our sight.









We have been fantastic artists and inventors this term! We have learnt how to mix two primary colours together to make secondary colours and have been printing using stamps we have made. We also designed and made our own inventions that could be used in space. We loved learning how to use the Makedo tools!

We are busy exploring the United Kingdom in Geography. We have had lots of fun on train rides together. You'll have to wait and see where we go next in the U.K.

## Year 2

We have had a super start to the year. We have been learning all about the Great Fire of London. We have learnt so many key facts about this important event in history and we have written some super stories about an animal experiencing the fire and a diary entry as Samuel Pepys.









We have been using our enquiry skills as scientists to carry out lots of experiments, including, testing materials to find out if they are waterproof, flammable or inflammable! We have considered properties of the materials we have investigated in order to design and make costumes for super heroes.

We have loved reading in our new school library too!



## Forest School News

Year 2 have been very busy at Forest School this term. We have developed our shelter building skills using ropes and tarps. Some of us have learnt new knots. The clove hitch was used to make bird perches and a technique called square lashing was used to make a ladder. Minibeasts are alive and well in our Forest School area and it was very exciting finding frogs and newts. We are keen to increase numbers and the variety of minibeast we find, so we have been creating homes for solitary bees and lady birds, beetle buckets and a bumble bee home. Lots of us like digging which is great for creating a large pit which can be turned into a hibernaculum (a place for amphibians to overwinter). We have learnt the names of some of our trees and made clay leaf prints to help us remember them. Did you know the hawthorn tree is also known as the fairy tree? The berries called haws are edible when cooked and we tasted hawthorn jelly. It was fun making mini-dens for the fairies. Foraging for apples gave us the idea to make apple pies in the mud kitchen. Yum Yum! Our plan is to open a woodland café in the future! In order to protect our young hedges we are learning how to build dead hedges. These will also provide habitats for wildlife. We are really pleased with our new waterproof suits which are comfortable to wear and will mean we can be out in all weathers as autumn progresses.

Don't hold a child with a sparkler.

Dip used sparklers in water.

Supervise children.

Avoid loose clothes.

Hold sparklers away from the body.

Don't wave sparkler near others or run.

Children of parents who do not wish to, or who are unable to contribute, will not be treated any differently. However, where there are insufficient contributions to make an activity viable, the activity may not be able to go ahead.

If your child is in receipt of Free School Meals (not Universal Free School Meals), your contribution is already covered through the Pupil Premium funding accessed through school and we are not asking you to contribute further. ### **PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING.**

As the cost of living continues to rise, there may be families in our school community whose personal/financial circumstances have changed since their child/children started school in Reception.



All children at CKIS are entitled to **Universal Free School meals**.

In addition to this, as part of the **Pupil Premium Funding**, your children could be eligible to additional funding which includes free school meals post the age of 7.

### Your child might be eligible if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

This benefits your family and your child/children in school. The **school receives funding** which is used to further enhance teaching and learning and improve outcomes for your child/ren and others across the school.
